NEIGHBORHOOD SCAVENGER HUNT

Scavenger Stop: Coeur d'Alene Park – Spokane's First Public Park Find the place where neighbors gather under tall trees, music fills the air, and the gazebo takes center stage!

Fun Fact: Coeur d'Alene Park is the oldest public park in Spokane established in 1891! It still brings the community together with concerts, block parties, and a popular farmers market.

Activity: Imagine you're setting up for a summer concert, where would the band play? How would you decorate the park? Can you act out your dream event?

Scavenger Stop: People's Park—Layers of History Walk where rivers meet and stories unfold, from ancient campfires to Expo 74 campsites.

Fun Fact: Archaeologists discovered evidence of human life here over 8,000 years ago. The area known as People's Park was once a salmon fishing site for Indigenous peoples and remains a cultural landmark today.

Activity: Can you spot where the river and creek meet? Imagine salmon once swam here, what do you think the park sounded like then?

Scavenger Stop: Coeur d'Alene Farmers Market

Fun Fact: Farmers markets aren't just for grown-ups! The Coeur d'Alene Farmers Market helps people in our community find fresh fruits and veggies grown by nearby farmers. It's like a giant outdoor treasure hunt for healthy snacks, and you get to meet the people who grew them!

> Free Activity: "Color Hunt Challenge!" Can you find a fruit or veggie in each of these colors? Red – Green – Yellow -Orange -**Purple** Bonus: Ask a farmer what their favorite thing to grow is!

Scavenger Stop: Overlook Park – Bridges and Big Views Find the spot with benches and a sweeping view.

Fun Fact: Overlook Park sits 500 feet above the Creek and was once just empty lots before the community transformed it into a scenic overlook and trailhead.

Activity: Count how many bridges you can see from the overlook. Try echo-calling across the valley or walk a bit down the trail, how far can you see from here? Imagine crossing those bridges into the city 100 years ago!

Scavenger Stop: Haunted Walking Tour – Browne's Addition In Spokane's oldest neighborhood, whispers of the past linger. Can you find the tour that leads you past ghostly tales and grand old homes?

Fun Fact: The Haunted Walking Tour of Browne's Addition shares eerie legends drawn from local lore, historic newspapers, and Chet Caskey's books. You'll hear about everything from long-lost cemeteries to feuding sisters who never quite made peace.

Activity: Use the custom Google Map or download the PDF from Spokane Public Library's website. As you walk, choose one house and make up your own spooky story to go with it.

Scavenger Stop: Redband Park Can you spot the signs about protecting fish and wildlife? They'll help you learn why the Spokane River is so special!

Fun Fact:

This park used to be a big stadium called Glover Field, where crowds came to cheer at parades and football games. Today, it's named after the Redband Rainbow Trout, a colorful fish important to the Spokane Tribe. The name change helps remind everyone to care for the river and the wildlife.

Activity: Trout Tracker Challenge! Pretend to swim like a Redband Trout across the field, then try to find three things that help nature; like plants, bugs, or water!
