Scavenger Stop: The Garbage Goat — Riverfront Park

Look for a metal goat hiding near the carousel. It's not just for show—this goat has an appetite for trash!

Fun Fact: The Garbage Goat was created by Spokane artist Paula Turnbull for Expo '74. It's a working vacuum sculpture that helps keep the park clean—and has been making people smile (and clean up!) for 50 years.

Activity: Feed the goat a safe piece of litter (it really slurps it up!), then explore the park to spot three more public art pieces. Can you find one shaped like a fish?

Scavenger Stop: Auntie's Bookstore — Spokane's Literary Landmark

Look for the cozy corner filled with stories and stacked with adventures—where

pages turn and imaginations soar.

Fun Fact: Auntie's Bookstore is Spokane's beloved indie bookshop! It's filled with both new and used books, fun gifts, and friendly book lovers. You can even trade in your gently used books for store credit—and join one of their many awesome book clubs!

Activity: Book Treasure Hunt! Head inside and try to find:

_A book with an animal on the cover
_A book with "Spokane" in the title
_ A silly greeting card

Bonus: Ask a bookseller for a recommendation and write down the title!

Scavenger Stop: GLOW Children Early Learning Center – Shine Bright!

Look for a place filled with giggles, chalk art, and tiny footsteps—where little
lights grow brighter every day.

Fun Fact:

GLOWCHILDREN stands for Go Light Our World! GLOW is a special early learning center that supports children from birth through age 12. GLOW works to create safe, joyful spaces for learning while advocating for equity and care for families in need.

Activity: Chalk the Walk!

Join the kids and create your own chalk masterpiece outside. Draw something that makes you feel happy or something that lights up your world!

Scavenger Stop: Riverfront Rotary Fountain
Follow the sound of splashing water! Find the big circle where water
shoots into the sky and kids love to play right in the heart of Riverfront
Park.

Fun Fact: This spot used to be covered in noisy train tracks and busy warehouses. People couldn't even get close to the river! Now, it's a fun, beautiful place with a fountain you can run through and trails to explore.

Activity: "Water Detective" Challenge!

How many big spray jets shoot up from the fountain?

Bonus: Pretend you're a train chugging around the fountain—choo

choo!

Scavenger Stop: Riverfront Park Carousel – Grab the Brass Ring!
Find the spinning circle of animals near the river—listen for music and
laughter in the air!

Fun Fact: This magical carousel was built in 1909 as a wedding gift and is now one of Spokane's most beloved treasures! It features 54 hand-carved horses, plus a giraffe, a goat, and even a tiger—all made over 100 years ago. Riders can still grab rings as they go around!

Activity: Pick your favorite animal from the carousel, are you bold like the tiger or bouncy like the goat? Head into the park and act it out! Can your friends guess which one you are?

Scavenger Stop: Spokane Falls — Roar of the River
Follow the sound that gets louder as you walk—can you hear the roar of the
river calling?

Fun Fact: Spokane Falls is loud, beautiful, and powerful—especially in spring when snow from the mountains melts into rushing water! For thousands of years, Native American tribes gathered here because the falls were a sacred and important place. Today, it's still the heart of the city, where nature and community meet.

Activity: Stand still and close your eyes; can you hear the falls? Feel the mist on your face? Now, pretend you're the water tumbling over the rocks. Twist, spin, splash! How loud can you make your waterfall sound?

Explore your neighborhood! Stop by a local business (like a bakery, barber shop, or market) and visit your community center to see what events or resources they offer for families. These places are great for making connections and learning more about your area!
